Inspired Design

Southview Design brings the landscape of a historic Summit Avenue home back to its roots.


TEXT BY MARCIA JEDD PHOTOGRAPHY BY KEVIN JOHNSTON, JOHNSTON IMAGING & INTERACTIVE Inspired by the work of Southview Design at a nearby home, Mark Thomas and Maureen Chevalier, married with three children, turned to the landscape design-build firm for a major outdoor renovation.

The result was a hardscape and greenscape project that transformed the look and feel of the family's 1899-built home along Summit Avenue. "We had several areas in our yard that were issues. The east side of the home is a shady area where grass doesn't grow, and we had kids'

playground equipment that wasn't used. Plus, the driveway was all cracked," explains Thomas. The family also wanted a place to entertain and grill out.

Major design elements of the project encompassed new clay pavers to replace and widen the old concrete driveway, a new patio, and additional landscaping. Front and back walkways, a parking pad and a utility/storage patio that feeds to the alley all feature the pavers. The result is an integrated design which honors

hydrangea tree accents the herringbone driveway. The curved walkway leads to a utility patio at the rear of the property.

Above: A PeeGee the home's heritage and anchors it to a long, narrow lot. "Living in an old historic home, clay pavers seemed to fit in more with the historic aesthetic. A cement paver looked a little too modern," Thomas says.

> Southview Design landscape designer Tim Johnson explains pavers offer superior performance over poured concrete for strength and the ability to resist cracking. "The baked-in color of the clay, versus concrete pavers, results in a more authentic color. We created our own

color blend and patterns using four different colors of pavers," Johnson says, noting the use of clay pavers also yielded more accurate colormatching to the home's existing brick.

The little-used playground equipment was removed to make way for a spacious patio, complete with pergola, lending intimacy and privacy. A showpiece fountain, complete with the calming sound of running water, is wellplaced on the east side of the backyard, enjoyed from most vantage points including the patio.

The circulating fountain is also heard from the home's second-floor sleeping porch.

Other hardscape elements of the project included replacing the front steps along the street, retaining walls, and a new garage floor. In addition, softscape elements were added such as mature pyramid-shaped arborvitae hedges that line the driveway on the west edge of the property.

The Thomas-Chevalier family is delighted to have more useable outdoor space. Favorites

include the patio and water feature, connected by a paver walkway. "We absolutely love it," Thomas says, adding, "In the past, we had a picnic table out in the grass but didn't use the yard that much. Now, we have a place to barbecue with the family and lounge in the shade while the kids play in the yard."
